OUR SCHOOL

Arlington High School is a four-year comprehensive school with an enrollment of 3200 students with recent graduating classes averaging 800 students. AHS is accredited by the NY State Education Department. We continue our long tradition of academic excellence. With over 213 course offerings, students experience an extensive and challenging range of studies to develop the necessary skills needed for college, the workplace and life. All classes meet at least 225 minutes/week and lab sciences meet approximately 360 minutes/week. AHS offers approximately 70 extracurricular activities.

OUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Arlington Admiral Marching Band was named the 2017 National Class NYSFBC State Champions (back to back with 2016). The Directors of the marching band are Mr. Darrell Keech and Mr. Evan Rzodkiewicz
- Arlington School District honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from The NAMM Foundation in March of 2018 for its outstanding commitment to music education. Arlington is one of 4% of districts across the nation receiving the prestigious award in 2018 and has received this designation every year since 2012
- Students selected from English classes at Arlington High School consistently place in the final round of the Literacy Connections Spelling Bee held each March at Marist College.
- Two students received gold medals (95th percentile), two received silver (85th-90th percentile) & 4 received bronze (75th-80th percentile), as well as 11 honorable mentions for their performance on the National French Exam.

The GPA is used to determine class rank. Each course is assigned a factor, which is listed with the course title. The GPA is determined by the formula:

GPA = sum of (grade x factor x credit) for each course total credits (excluding Pass/Fail courses)

DIPLOMAS

New York State offers three accredited diplomas; local, Regents and Advanced Regents. The requirements for all diplomas include competency in reading, writing, science, mathematics, Global Studies and United States History and Government. 22 credits are required and include:

GRADES: A numerical system is used with a range from 0 to 100. The minimum passing grade is 65%.

REPORT CARDS

Report cards are issued four times during the year. The grade shown at the end of each report period is the student's grade for that marking period only and is a reflection of both class work and tests.

The final course average entered on the permanent record is the combination of the class average (4/5) and the final examination (1/5). The report card shows the final examination grade, the Regents examination grade, if applicable, and the final course average in each course.

ADVANCED ACADEMICS

In May 2018, 679 Arlington students took 1606 exams. 66 % scored a 3 or better and 36% scored a 4 or better.
