A Message from Ms. Todd

★ An absence note is required for all absences, even if you have informed the school nurse or Main Office via phone call. Please send your child in with an absence note the day they return to school. Absence notes must include the following:

Your child's first and last name

★ Bus Stops -

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Please ensure that there is an individual at the bus stop with a bus tag for **ALL K, 1 & Journeys students.** If there is no one at the stop to receive the child, they will be returned to ASM. Please know this is often very upsetting to the child and can impact the ASM staff who also have family waiting for them after school.



A Message from Ms. Todd, con't.

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It is important to recognize that our students are tiny humans who are learning how to navigate their world. This means that they are going to make choices that are not always kind or helpful. However, it is extremely important that we teach our students to take responsibility for their choices.

At Arthur S. May School we use Responsive Classroom to address behavior issues and concerns. The following slides explain what the Responsive Classroom approach is and how it supports our students at ASM. I encourage you to explore some of these at home.

Responsive Classroom & Logical Consequences

Characteristics of Logical Consequences:

Respectful

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• Staff are respectful in their tone and language when conferencing with a student. The conversation focuses on the student's behavior, not the student's character.

Relevant

• The consequence should be directly related to the child's **\$** actions.

<u>Realistic</u>

The consequence must be practicable and implemented in a reasonable amount of time.

Within the Responsive Classroom model, there are three overarching types of logical consequences:

Reparations - You break it, you fix it

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This type of logical consequence is used in situations when something has been broken or a mess has been made—whether accidentally or intentionally. The consequence is that those responsible for the problem take responsibility for fixing it. Teachers use this type of logical consequence when they see an opportunity for a child to solve a problem he or she has caused.

Example: Adam becomes upset and rips another student's work. He helps tape it back together and apologizes to mend the relationship with the other student.

Loss of Privilege

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This type of logical consequence is used when a child's behavior does not meet pre-established expectations. The consequence is that the child loses the privilege of participating in an activity or using materials for a brief time, usually a class period or a day. What's taken away must be directly related to the misbehavior, and the teacher must make sure that the child truly understands and can live up to expectations. Teachers use this type of logical consequence when children defy, test, or simply forget the rules.

<u>Example</u>: Garth's class job for the week is line leader, but as he leads the class to lunch, he leans into a classroom to wave hello to a friend. The teacher tells Garth that he has lost the privilege of being line leader for the day and temporarily gives that responsibility to another child. Later, she checks in with Garth to make sure he remembers and understands the expectations for walking in line.

Positive Time Out - Recharge Zone

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This type of logical consequence is used when a teacher believes that a child needs a way to calm down and recover self-control. The consequence is that the child moves to a pre-established place in the classroom, takes time to regroup, and then rejoins the class once they have calmed down. Teachers use "take a break" to keep minor misbehaviors—intentional and accidental—from escalating and becoming disruptive, and to give children opportunities to practice strategies they've learned for regaining self-control. Because many children have experienced punitive uses of time-out, it's important for teachers to explain that "in this class, time-out simply gives us the time and space we all sometimes need to get ourselves in check when we begin to lose our cool."

Example: Mark disrupts a math lesson by calling out answers without raising his hand. The teacher sends him to the "take a break" place. In the minute or two he spends there, Mark calms down using self-calming techniques the class has learned, and then returns to his regular seat.

Unfortunately it is inevitable that our students will get sick, especially as we head into FLU & cold season. Do YOUR part in helping minimize the spread by not sending your child(ren) to school sick.

 \star If your child tests Positive for COVID, Contact the Health Office immediately.

- A positive case of COVID requires students to be 24 hours free from fever, vomiting, and/or diarrhea without medication prior to returning to school. It is strongly suggested to return to school wearing a mask
- ★ With ANY illness, symptoms must be significantly improved or resolved before your child is able to return to school.
- ★ All students must be 24 hours free from fever, vomiting, and/or diarrhe without medication prior to returning to school!
- ★ If a student arrives to school stating they vomited that morning or the night prior, a call will be made home to inquire.

The District Equity Team is hosting "Access Arlington" at Arlington High School on Saturday, September 28th Ipm-3pm. The purpose of this event is to help our families understand the services and communication structures within the Arlington Central School District they will need in order to best support their child.

Attendees can attend two of the following sessions:

UNDERSTANDING THE DIGNITY FOR ALL STUDENTS ACT (DASA)

Receive information/clarification about what the DASA law states, how it protects and supports students, staff, and families, and what is covered under the law. We will also discuss the process of initiating a DASA report, and what your rights as parents are under the law.

COMMUNICATING WITH THE DISTRICT - WHO AND HOW?

Participate in an open discussion about current communication systems families have access to in Arlington. Communication chains in individual buildings will be discussed, as well as how to use the Arlington District Website. Families will also be able to ask questions about ParentSquare, School Tool and the Parent Portal(s).

NAVIGATING STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES AND SPECIAL EDUCATION

Designed to improve families' understanding of student support services available in Arlington and help families understand the processes to access services needed for their child. Families will receive information about the processes involved in Response to Intervention (RTI), 504%, and Special Education.
